From the South M5 exit at Junction 6 (Worcester North) take second exit onto A449 Kidderminster for about a mile take exit A4536 Blackpole turn left onto Blackpole Road Follow Worpex direction signs.

From the North M5 exit at Junction 6 (Worcester North) take fourth exit onto A449 Kidderminster for about a mile take exit A4536 Blackpole turn left onto Blackpole Road Follow Worpex direction signs.

From Redditch, Bromsgrove and Droitwich A38 to Fernhill Heath turn left onto the A4536 Blackpole Road, follow Worpex direction signs.

From Kidderminster / Worcester A449 Worpex direction signs from Ombersley, take the A4536 exit at the junction turn right on to Blackpole Road follow Worpex direction signs.

From the West Tembury Wells, Holt Heath and Ombersley Worpex signs onto A449 Worcester, take the A4536 exit at the junction turn right on to Blackpole Road follow Worpex direction signs.

Alternative route from Evesham, Malvern and Hereford join the M5 at Junction 7 (Worcester South) head north as far as junction 6 (Worcester North) directions for Kidderminster A449, second exit on to A449, then as far as A4536 Blackpole exit turn left onto Blackpole Road follow Worpex direction signs.

SOCIETY REPORTS

BANBURY STAMP SOCIETY

On Tuesday January 16th the Society welcomed Ken Flint as presenter. His subject was Cyprus, and Ken started by explaining how his collection began as a result of visiting the island in 1979 through family connections. As a collector he was drawn in by the sight of a stamp shop and after purchasing Greek material, was also offered some ‘under the counter’ material in the form of Turkish stamps, along with a warning that he could be deported if caught with the material! Attracted by the designs, Ken continued to collect year packs through the Philatelic Bureau and his presentation was a history of Cyprus as depicted by its stamp issues.

Cypriot history started in the Stone Age, but the discovery of copper gave the country its name and, in Greek times, the cult of Aphrodite arose on the island. The Roman invasion led to 500 years of relatively peaceful occupation and Paphos has remarkable mosaics which were preserved by earthquakes. In 45AD. Paul converted Paphos to Christianity and the Byzantine churches and their art work were particularly well represented on



stamps, covers and maxi-cards. In the 11th Century, Cyprus became bound up with the Crusaders – King Richard I rescued his fiancée Berengaria and married her on Cyprus and a number of crusader castles were built – again, well represented on stamps. Cyprus eventually came under the Ottoman Empire which allowed the church to continue its presence on the island but by 1853, with the agreement of Turkey, Britain took over and continued to administer the colony. Independence in 1960 also gave rise to the US and UK retaining Sovereign Bases on the island.

The second half of the display covered the turmoil since independence, driven loyalties divided between Greece and Turkey. Fighting, civil unrest and interventions from Turkey led to the UN becoming involved as a peace keeping force – a six month mandate in 1964 which is still in place today, 54 years later. In 1974, Turkey invaded the island in order to facilitate a cease fire after an attempted coup by Greek Cypriots and the resultant partition has been in place ever since. Ken’s material from the second half included mail from UN soldiers, particularly from Canada, as well as internal mail showing how the Turkish administered area developed its own postal issues and postal service, eventually replacing Greek names for villages with Turkish ones. It was particularly

fascinating to hear from one of our members who had been living in the north of the island when Turkey invaded.

HINCKLEY AND DISTRICT PHILATELIC SOCIETY

On October 31st Giles du Boulay gave a presentation concentrating on the City of Danzig during the period 1919 – 1939. The display began at the end of World War I with the Treaty of Versailles where Danzig was carved up between the Germans and Poland and made a free city after being part of the German Empire. After the War the Allies effectively split Germany in half with Poland being given the important sea port of Danzig and creating the ‘Polish Corridor’. A propaganda war began as the majority of its citizens remained ethnic Germans and made every attempt to let the Poles know this. The display included rare material consisting of military and commercial mail and explained the effects of inflation, and the postal warfare between the Polish and German postal services which were operating simultaneously.

The second part of the display began during 1934 – 1935 where it was obvious that another war was coming and censorship of the mail started. There was an attack on the Polish Post Office building that was defended by 30 Polish postmen until they were forced to surrender and eventually executed. Events culminated in 1939 when the German battleship ‘Schleswig-Holstein’ sailed to Danzig on a courtesy visit with a force of hidden Stormtroopers. On September 1st, the battleship moved upstream and positioned itself off the Westerplatte (Polish Garrison) and began the bombardment that signalled the invasion of Poland and the start of the War.

On November 7th, John Davies of Banbury stepped in at the last minute as the visiting speaker and he gave a presentation of material relating to the 1890 celebration of 50 years since the issue of the Penny Black in 1840. He explained that his display consisted of exhibition material and ephemera as well as postcards, lettercards and handstamps that were specially produced for the celebrations in London’s Guildhall. Ephemera included tickets for those lucky enough to attend and the menus for the official dinner. The display also included official 1d lettercards that sold at 6d each which could be posted in a temporary letter sorting office established at the Guildhall. Of special interest was an example of the red Official Mail Bag labels used to seal the mail bags (only two are known). He also showed one of three known examples of Registered Mail sent from the Guildhall. He also showed examples of postal orders and money orders cancelled with one or more of the special handstamps produced for the event.

In the second half he showed material from the July 1890 Exhibition held at South Kensington Museum. There was again a fully operational post office that used a special pneumatic tube post that cost 1d to send an item – there was an additional

3d to pay if a reply was required. Reply examples are therefore scarce. He also showed a sheet of the 28 postmarks available to be applied to any item that was sold at the Exhibition. A special Jubilee envelope was on sale for one day which was on sale at 1/- and could be purchased in bundles of 10 envelopes with a special wrapper or ten bundles of ten envelopes wrapped in a special wrapper. He also showed pencil drawings, proofs and telegrams exchanged between the designer and Exhibition committee.

REDDITCH PHILATELIC SOCIETY

On 19th January there was a visit by Worcester Philatelic and Postcard Society. This interesting evening deserved a bigger audience, as we had such an eclectic mix of subjects.

David Grant started with some important aspects of the history of the RAF, as evidenced by photos, cuttings, letters, leaflets and some Commonwealth stamps bearing images of many an old warplane. The service started life on 1st April 1918 absorbing the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Air Service. New ranks had to be invented from aircraftman to air marshal. In the early days, the RAF employed airships as well as “heavier than air machines”, David mentioned the R34, which made an emergency landing in Mineola, Long Island in 1919 carrying the first passengers to land in the USA by air. The focus moved to the pre-war Schneider Trophy races for seaplanes and the emergence of the Supermarine Spitfire, saved by a donation of £100,000 by the philanthropist Lady (Lucy) Houston in 1931. By wartime, most of the production had moved to Castle Bromwich. The rival Hawker Hurricane was developed at Brooklands at Weybridge in Surrey. The first sortie of the war was a recce over Wilhelmshaven on 3rd September, the day Britain joined the war; this was shortly followed by Whitley bombers dropping six million leaflets over Germany. David had some of these on show, in German and English. There was a chart showing details of the 2,140 military aircraft available now, including bi-planes. On to supporting the BEF in France (British Expeditionary Force) and the engagement following the German invasion of Denmark and Norway in 1940. Balloons were widely employed to block low-flying bombers. Autogyros (“a type of rotorcraft that uses an unpowered rotor in autorotation to develop lift, and an engine-powered propeller, similar to that of a fixed-wing aircraft, to provide thrust”) were used for coastal work.

Jonathan took us through the life of an issue from start to finish (1896-1902). These attractive definitives of “small queens and large queens” were produced initially for British East Africa, an area of colonisation later to become Kenya. A protectorate was created in 1895 with Mombasa as its capital. We saw die proofs

and colour trials, water marks and many a shade variation and pages of the stamps and postmarks (14 different known). The currency was rupee and annas. The stamps were overprinted for use in Zanzibar and then some Zanzibar stamps were overprinted for use back in “BEA” (“provisionals”) in December 1896 when there was a dire shortage of stamps. Other stamps were overprinted for use in Uganda. This was a time of flux in the region with the formation of new colonies. There was a set of stamps featuring the Sultan of Zanzibar, covers illustrating different postage rates for foreign destinations, registered mail, high value revenue and judicial issues. There was ship mail and runner mail and a TPO service (1899).



After the customary tea break, Jim Grey launched an enthusiastic celebration of the life of the famous golfer (1929-2016). Arnold Palmer was born in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, a working-class steel mill town. His dad was the pro and green keeper at the local golf club. After winning the US Amateur in Detroit in 1954 Arnold gave up his job selling paint and went on to win a host of tournaments up to 1970. He was also prominent in establishing golf as TV entertainment. Jim felt that the USA had been mean in the share of commemoratives

featuring golf and Arnold Palmer in particular. Bobby Jones and Babe Zaharias appeared in 1981 and Francis Quimet in 1988 and golf is represented in the 1995 sports issue. Arnold Palmer himself does feature on several foreign stamps including Somaliland and Mozambique. Jim also showed magazine articles, a birthday card, the GB golf courses set of 2008 and some cigarette cards. Sam Snead (1912-2002), another golfer was highlighted. He and Arnold had been victorious partners in the Canada Cup in 1960. The display stretched into bizarre links, the letters “PALMER” being enough for Jim, e.g. Palmers Green covers. John Hodges presented the history of our regiment, illustrated by a remarkable collection of postcards focussing on each of the 18 battalions plus three more of volunteers reserved for home defence. A battalion is a body of men up to 1,000 in wartime, divided into a small number of companies and itself forming part of a brigade. It is the smallest unit with a degree of autonomy. The Worcestershire Regiment dates to 1694 when Colonel Thomas Farrington, an officer of the

Coldstream Guards raised a new regiment in London. It was then the custom for Regiments to be named after their Colonels, and this new Regiment was named

Farrington's Regiment of Foot. This method of naming regiments led to confusion, as regiments were re-named with each Colonel, and it was possible for more than one Colonel, and therefore more than one regiment, to have the same name. Until 1751, the Regiment had eight different Colonels, and therefore eight different names. In 1751 regiments were given numbers, and the Regiment was



numbered 29.” County titles were introduced in 1781.

A second battalion was formed in 1881 and a third in 1900. By 1914 there were eight, the rest were raised in WW1. John mentioned distinctive features of some of the battalions, for instance the 3rd was noted for marksmanship, the 14th were pioneers but not exempt from fighting if required, the 15th was “transport” and the 17th were garrison guards. The volunteer regiments were raised from three Worcestershire towns: Kidderminster, Worcester and Redditch.

My favourite postcard was a cartoon of a startled Kaiser on horseback above the inscription: For goodness sake halt! Der Worcesters are koming. In 1970 the regiment was amalgamated with the Sherwood Foresters (Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Regiment) to form the Worcestershire and Sherwood Foresters Regiment which was, in September 2007, amalgamated with the Cheshire Regiment and the Staffordshire Regiment (Prince of Wales's) to form the Mercian Regiment. This subject could fill an evening. The regiment has a model website providing detailed history of the battalions.

On 1st June the guest speaker was Richard Wheatley on the subject of Netherlands Postal History. The Dutch East India Company (Vereenigde Oost Indische Compagnie) was originally established as a chartered company in 1602 and is considered to be the first truly international company. Statistically the VOC eclipsed all its rivals in international trade for almost 200 years. The British East India Company its nearest rivals were a distant second. The VOC traded throughout Asia, ships coming from the Netherlands carrying supplies into Batavia from the Netherlands and from VOC settlements in Asia. Richard displayed the postal markings of the VOC which were introduced in 1789. His comprehensive display traced the routes and rates up to 1877 when the colony joined the General Postal Union. Both inland mail and mail overseas were shown

from the period 1789 to 1808 the French period 1808 to 1811 and the British occupation 1811 to 1816. The second half of the evening was devoted to the early stamps of the Dutch East Indies mainly from the period of King Willem III which included colour proofs and post cards. The talking point of the evening was the native runner cover from the dense forests of North West Celebes dated 1938. Postal runners were illiterate so feathers were attached to the item to indicate how urgent the mail was. The one displayed had one feather of each colour which denoted very urgent, to travel day and night. It was signed by the head man of each village along the way and took two days to cover 80 miles.

This was a very interesting display of unusual material from an area of collecting unfamiliar to quite a few of us.
